- U-5 Malaria Prevalence - 42%
- 25% of childhood mortality
- 11% of maternal mortality
- Annual decrease in GDP - 1%
- Annual National loss - N480 b

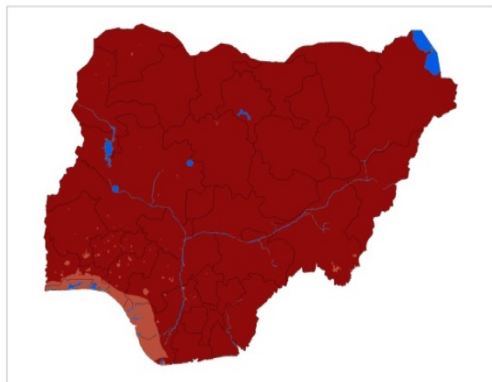

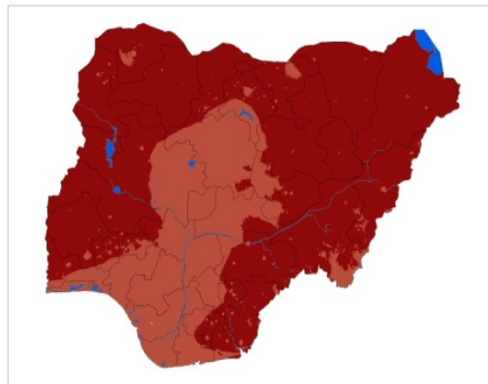
Shift from Hyper- to Meso-endemic: Result of multiple interventions



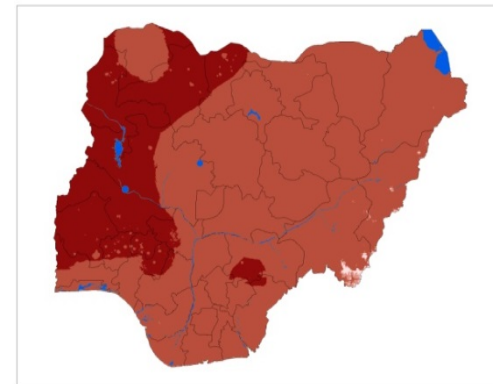
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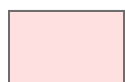
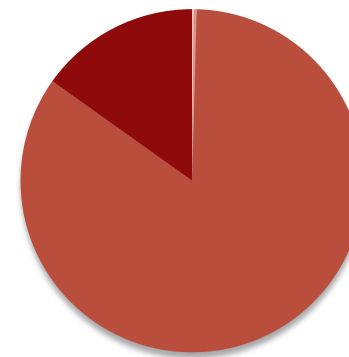
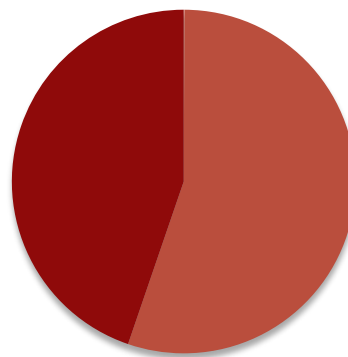
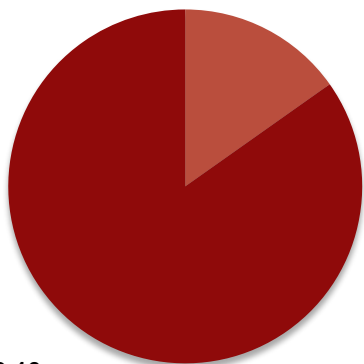

Priority Areas for Private Sector support



- Establishing more sentinel sites for monitoring malaria trend and resistance of chemicals used for vector control
- Embark on local manufacture of essential malaria commodities (including LLINs, RDTs, ACTs)
 - Support and Assist NMEP in strengthening logistics management of commodities (warehouses, transportation / commodity distribution, and infrastructure)
- Airing of sustained Public Service Announcements for public awareness of what individuals and groups can do (including radio and TV jingles, mobile phone messages)
- Providing IT packages for tracking malaria interventions and progress e.g. SMS



Existing Partnerships



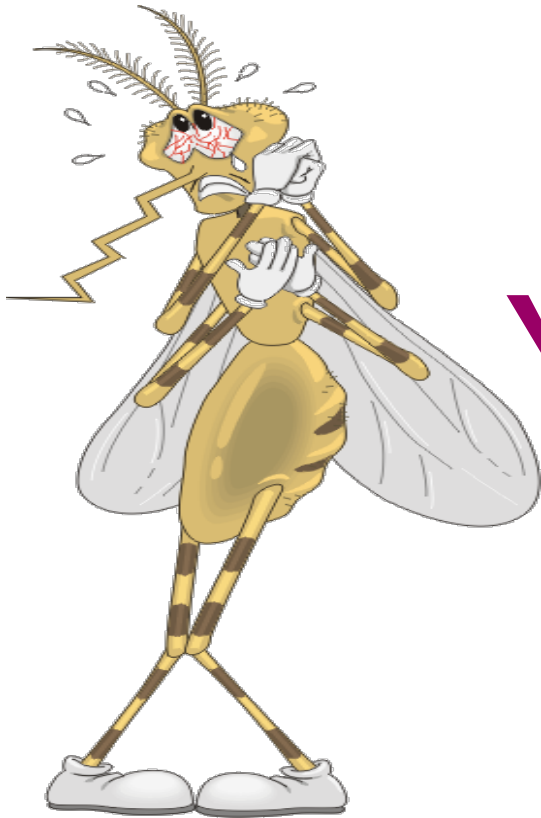
- Dangote Foundation Private Sector Engagement Project - Strategy document to engage key private sector players in Nigeria meaningfully in the malaria fight.
- Affordable Medicines Facility malaria (AMFm) project has helped to involve the private sector in increasing availability and affordability of malaria medicines.
- Night Watch – ExxonMobil and Malaria No More recently embarked on a multimedia campaign to help NMEP achieve a malaria-free Nigeria through sustained awareness creation.
- Etisalat has demonstrated that widespread mobile phone text messaging is a promising tool for malaria control and elimination.



INCENTIVES FOR THE PRIVATE SECTOR IN MALARIA CONTROL ACTIVITIES



- Nigerian economy loses an estimated US\$1.1 billion each year due to malaria-related absenteeism and treatment costs.
- Investments to address this endemic burden makes good economic sense: – a “win-win” strategy where both the community and the private sector workers benefit.
- Malaria control is a cost-effective business investment that offers a rapid rate of return. Research from 3 Zambian companies estimated a rate of return of at least 28%.
- Coverage of Malaria interventions has increased dramatically with multiple new strategies (IRS, Larviciding, SMC)
- Eliminating malaria (the primary health concern for 78% of Nigerians) would be an efficient manner to create impact with organizations’ CSR resources.
